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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Sau. Rajanitai Nanasaheb Deshmukh Arts, Commerce and Science College, Bhadgaon, District-Jalgaon was established by Pachora Taluka Cooperative Education Society Ltd., Pachora in 1979. Bhadgaon is one of the rural tahsils in the Jalgaon District of Maharashtra with the population around 32000. Majority of its inhabitants are farmers, agricultural workers, and small traders. It is situated on the sacred river Girana and along national highway 753J. Central Railway stations Bhusawal Jn, Jalgaon Jn, Pachora Jn, and Chalisaon Jn are conveniently located nearby. Aurangabad (today Chhatrapati Sambhaji Nagar) (MS) is approximately 150 kilometres away. ????????

The institution was founded with the goal of integrating students from rural areas into the mainstream of higher education. The institution offers students the chance to become independent and responsible Indian citizens. Our college is permanently affiliated with Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgoan since 2007, and recognized by UGC under Sections 2(f) and 12 (B) in the year 2004 and 2009 respectively.

To impart quality education for rural students to face new challenges of life and make them well knowledgeable, self-reliant, and responsible citizens of India.

Mission

To provide qualitative and valuable service in the field of education, overall personality development of student fraternity through extracurricular activities and offer a platform to the students by giving them an opportunity to face all the challengers of competitive world with at most utilisation of their potential in sports, athletics, and other events. To bring higher education to the doorsteps of the stakeholders.

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1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- Proactive and dynamic Management, well-disciplined learning environment.
- The college has dual campus, well equipped and furnished laboratories, and adequate infrastructure.
- Dedicated, experienced and well qualified, well trained academic faculty out of 19 permanent faculties' 11 faculties having doctoral degree.
- Good quality infrastructure with specious playground, Wi-Fi facility, ample class rooms, and the whole campus is under the CCTV surveillance.
- The enrolment of girl students is comparatively more than boys.
- College conducted various national level seminar, webinar, workshops and conferences.
- College has a recognized Research Laboratory, 6 Ph. D. guides, with research outcome of more than 100 research articles and 1 Ph. D. awarded depicting good research culture.
- Upbeat N.S.S. Unit, Yuwati Sabha, and Student Welfare Department, Career Katta, social extension activities through various cultural programmes.
- The physical education department is highly proactive with around 200 students selected for various defence services such as Army, BSF, SRP, Police, CRPF, through sports excellence.
- Career Oriented Certificate and skill-based courses are implemented from past two years. These include "Certificate course in Taxation and Insurance", "Certificate course in developing spoken and English Skills", "Certificate course in Consumer Behaviour and Marketing Research", "Certificate course in Yoga and Pranayam".
- Considerable number of students have been awarded with Gold, Silver, Bronze medals in district level 'Gandhi Sanskar Pariksha' organized by Gandhi Research Foundation, Jain Hills, Jalgaon.

Institutional Weakness

- 100% recruitment in the aided section of the college is not possible due to Government policies.
- Being in rural area, students' limitations to participate in more co-curricular and extension activities.
- Job opportunities at local level are considerably low due to rural area.
- English language barrier for students.
- Unavailability of the hostel facility for the students.
- Lack of PG courses.

Institutional Opportunity

- To start more Add on / Career Oriented Courses to provide more job opportunities.
- Community linked extension activities can be extended to surrounding areas.
- Scope to organize more gender sensitization programmes and women empowerment programs.
- Arranging more professional training programmes for teaching and non-teaching staff.
- To introduce new courses based on NEP 2020 as per the University guidelines.
- To enhance the activities of coaching to students for competitive examination.
- Motivate faculty members to develop/create quality e-content in their respective subject areas for SWAYAM/NPTEL/e-PG Pathshala.

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Institutional Challenge

- Some courses are on permanently non-grant basis.
- Government policies to recruit the teaching and non-teaching staffs.
- To start professional skill development courses on no-grant basis.
- Being located in rural area, there are difficulties in collaborating with industrial and other reputed institutions.
- Lack of non-salary grants and other funds.
- To motivate rural girl students towards higher education.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated with Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. Aspects of the curriculum are aligned with the university's policies and structure. Every year at the commencement of the academic year, the college creates an academic calendar. During the preparation of the academic calendar, all activities, including curricular, co-curricular, internal assessment, etc., are included. For effective curriculum delivery, each faculty prepares an annual teaching plan for courses of concern. IQAC ensures curriculum delivery effectiveness.

All of the programs offered by the college follow the CBCS format, which affords students some academic flexibility. The college offers four certificate programs, of which three are designed by the university and one is designed by the college, with the goal of enhancing the employability of the students by enhancing their abilities.

Cross-cutting issues such as ethics, gender, human values, environment, and sustainability are integrated into the curriculum. The college engages in numerous initiatives to engage students in social initiatives and community service. Environmental Studies project work is assigned to all first-year students across all programs. It contains initiatives on pollution, sustainable development, global warming, and the clean India movement, among others. The college organizes field excursions to familiarize students with environmental consciousness. The college has a system for accumulating feedback from all stakeholders and analyzing it to determine the appropriate course of action. Annually, both online and offline feedback has been collected. The analyzed feedback and action taken reports are posted on the website of the institution.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

For enhancing learning experiences, the institution employs student-centered approaches, such as experiential learning, collaborative learning, and problem-solving techniques. Regular organization of classroom seminars, group discussions, individual classroom presentations, curricular and co-curricular activities, and competitions aids students' learning.

The institution has mechanisms in place to ensure compliance with government and university regulations. The average percentage of reserved seats occupied is 100%. The college adheres to the Central and state reservation policies. 64 percent of sanctioned teaching positions are occupied. Presently, 21 faculty members hold a Ph.D. / NET / SET degree. The ratio of teachers to students at this school is 1:32.55% of permanent faculty members

have a Ph.D.

Teachers also implement ICT-enabled teaching-learning practices in the classroom with the use of a projector, enotes, and informative videos posted to multiple Whatsapp groups.

Few of faculty members have their own YouTube channels where they provide regular e-content. During the pandemic, instructors utilized ICT tools more effectively using platforms such as Zoom and Google meet. The IQAC has established a mentor-mentee system with a ratio of 1:36.

All departments evaluate students by administering periodic tests, tutorials, college and university practical examinations, and internal and external university examinations. In addition, we hold group discussions, seminars, Display English-Marathi 'word of the day', Gandhi Vichar Sanskar Exam, Shiv Vichar Exam, and provide consistent feedback.

To assure the effectiveness of the examination mechanism, an internal examination committee oversees the monitoring and implementation of the internal examination and evaluation procedure. Affiliated university administers external examinations and evaluations. At the college and university level, grievances regarding examination form submission, hall ticket, change of subject, grade record, etc. are addressed in a timely manner.

Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes for all Programmes are displayed on the website, and the achievement of POs and COs is regularly assessed.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institute has been proactively promoting a culture of research. For this reason, a Research Committee has been established to supervise the progress of all college research projects. It serves a crucial role in developing students' and teachers' research skills. 11 out of 19 faculty members have earned their Ph.D. Geography laboratories is a recognized research laboratory, and six faculty members on campus serve as research guide.

During the assessment period, the institute has hosted a number of workshops, seminars, webinars, and conferences. Considering the necessity and importance of research, faculty members are constantly encouraged to publish their research papers in prestigious international journals; as a result, faculty members have published research papers in UGC-recognized/Care-listed/refereed/peer-reviewed journals. At international, national, and state seminars and conferences, 70 conference papers and book chapters have been published/presented. To instill research skills in students and prepare them to compete in the Avishkar Research Project Competition. Through its NSS volunteers, the college actively participates in extension activities to benefit society. Together with Bhadgaon's rural hospital, the institute organizes a blood donation exercise. In the past five years, the NSS has organized tree planting, street plays, rallies, a flood relief rally, an AIDS awareness rally, and a legal awareness program with the Bhadgaon civil court. During the pandemic, the NSS unit organized two vaccination camps and a vaccination awareness campaign.

During the pandemic, NSS volunteers served their adopted community. This work was lauded for its excellence. The institute has signed collaboration agreements (MOU) with numerous reputable institutions and industries.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institution ensures infrastructure and physical facilities are sufficient. The college has two campus locations located with a distance of around 1 km from each other.

The original campus includes science laboratories, adequate classrooms, a library, a seminar hall, a computer lab, the IQAC office, the NSS office, and the staff room, while the new campus includes a gymnasium with multiple facilities, a library, a common room for girls, lavatories for boys and girls, a staff room, and a sports field.

The institute's laboratories for Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Geography, Computer Science, and Commerce, among others, are spacious. All these laboratories are having all essential equipment e.g. PC based UV spectrophotometer, G.M. counter, Polari meter, potentiometer, PH meter, Refractrometer, Colorimeter, Single distillation assembly, plane table survey sets, GPS, Abny level, Indian Clinometer, Prismatic campus, Theodolite, Pocket Stereoscope, Mirror Stereoscope, Dumpy level, Slide projector, Overhead projector, Arial photograph, hygrometer etc. Continually attempting to expand its infrastructure, the institute allocates a sufficient budget to infrastructure development. Every year, at the commencement of the financial year, provisions are made in the annual budget. Annually, the Institute has spent a portion of its budget on infrastructure, academic, and physical facilities.

Lib-Cloud MasterSoft - Library Management System ensures a well-stocked and automated library. The institute library has a collection of 25,446 books, 23 periodicals, and 6 publications. There is a student reading room that can accommodate approximately 30 students. Since 2012, the Library has subscribed to N-LIST Database. The library's university-funded 'Student Facility Centre' has three internet-capable workstations.

The library includes amenities such as an OPAC for searching books, QR codes on some books and for library visitors. Computers, scanners, printers, a xerox copier, and an LCD projector, etc., have been added to the college's IT infrastructure over the past five years in response to changing needs and demands.

The college has increased the bandwidth of its internet connection from 10 Mbps to 100 Mbps. The college has three ICT-equipped classrooms and seminar rooms. There are sufficient computer systems in the commerce laboratory. Complete college campus is monitored by CCTV.

Student Support and Progression

Students are the primary stakeholders of the institution and the institution has been evolving measures like student empowerment, inclusive practices and skill development which are student-supportive and student centric. The practice of social inclusion, financial incentives and welfare measures has been internalized in the institutional processes.

The college ensures prompt application and disbursement of SC/ST/OBC/Minority scholarship provided by the State Government and the Government of India. Financial assistance is also given by college Staff members as well as social commodities to the needy students under 'One Day One Rupee Scheme' and 'Vichar Dhan'. The institute follows a mentoring system in which around 35 students are assigned to each faculty member.

The mentors will periodically meet with the students to assess their performance and development. In addition, the consistent academic and other support for students taking competitive exams has increased, leading to an

increase in admissions to higher education institutions. The institute organizes numerous capacity-building initiatives, such as the Swyamsiddha Abhiyan and the Personality Development Camp. Numerous co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, such as the annual social gathering, National Service Scheme (NSS), and athletics at the zonal and university levels, as well as student welfare cells, facilitate the holistic development and social maturity of the students. A number of students have triumphed in sports at the national level and won awards while representing their state and university in a variety of competitions. The institution has a career guidance cell to assist and motivate students in their preparation for various competitive examinations. The college publishes the magazine 'Tutari' so that students can demonstrate their creative abilities by composing articles on contemporary social, educational, economic, and other developments.

The institution has a transparent system for addressing student complaints. Several academic and administrative bodies/committees of the institution include student representation. The committees include the Discipline Committee, the Anti-Ragging Committee, the IQAC, and the Sexual Harassment Committee, among others. The college's Alumni Association is registered with the charity commissioner as 'Sau Rajanitai Nanasaheb Deshmukh Collegians, Alumni Association Bhadgaon (Reg. No. MH/12/2022) Tal. Bhadgaon. Alumni Association contributes to the institution's growth through monetary and non-monetary initiatives.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Executive Council is the apex body of PTC Education Society and College Development Committee (CDC) that plans policies and executes developmental activities of the college by establishing values and a participatory decision-making process in accordance with the college's vision and mission to establish organizational traditions.

The university supports democratic, decentralized, and participatory government. Through collaboration and participatory governance, the Leadership, CDC, Principal, IQAC, and faculty play a crucial role in the design and implementation of the institution's quality policies for teaching, learning, research, and extension activities.

The institution provides medical reimbursement, group insurance, retirement felicitation programs, and other welfare benefits for teaching and non-teaching personnel.

E-governance has been implemented in operational areas such as Administration, Finance and Accounts, Student Admission and Support, and Examination and Evaluation.

IQAC has become valuable in proposing a variety of college quality enhancement measures. It performs a catalytic role in the college's quality improvement. The IQAC has organized quality-related seminars, webinars, and workshops on diverse topics, including IPR and research.

Several post-accreditation initiatives are being implemented, including the effective implementation of an online feedback system, the regular practice of ICT lectures, the improvement of teacher quality and profile, the registration of an Alumni Association with the Charity Commissioner in Jalgaon, and the organization of webinars, seminars, conferences, workshops, and faculty development programs.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Both campuses of the institution are monitored by CCTV, ensuring a safe and secure environment for students.

Through the 'Yuvati Sabha and Swayam Siddha Abhiyan', the institute organizes gender equality programs such as Women Empowerment, Lecture on Laws Protecting Women, Self-Defense Training Camp, and Personality Development Camp, etc. The university has implemented security and safety measures, particularly for female students. The College has a female common space. The ladies' common room is equipped with a disposal machine and a sanitary napkin vending machine. The institute hosts events to promote the truth, compassion, nonviolence, peace, integrity, and social harmony. The institution celebrates the birth and death anniversaries of notable figures/heroes in order toinstill ethics in its students.

The Institution employs LED tubes to conserve energy. The Campus is endowed with abundant vegetation. The solid and electronic waste management system conforms to the regulations. A rainwater collection apparatus has been installed. The majority of pupils use public transportation to get to college. The institution strives for a paperless office. The college provides divyangjan-friendly restrooms, wheel chairs, and other amenities for students with special needs.

In order tofulfill our commitment to social responsibilities, the college has regularly participated in a number of community service projects. Every Saturday is 'No Vehicle Day' in order to maintain a green and healthful campus. The college has conducted a Green and Energy Audit as part of an initiative to promote a green and healthful campus. Two best practices have been implemented by the college, including the "One Day One Rupee Scheme" and the "Debating and elocution competition for personality development." The college commemorates holidays such as Republic Day and Independence Day to foster patriotism and social consciousness among students. Since the 2019-2020 academic year, we have adopted the credit system (CBCS). It is now completely implemented across all Programmes. The university will register for Academic bank of credits. A suitable technical support system will be created for monitoring Academic bank of credits.
3. Skill development:	The college's mission is to promote Value-Based Quality Education; consequently, it strives to instill positivity in its students. According to KBC NMU, Jalgaon, the college offer CBCS pattern for UG programs beginning in 2019. The college has designed four Certificate courses, and degree courses in response to the local demands and skill requirements. College has established a Competitive Examination Guidance to enable students to investigate post-graduation employment opportunities and maximize their studies. The college encourage students to enrol in Swayam and other MOOC platform to gain extra skills and knowledge. Approximately 20% of teachers have completed various skill development courses such as refresher courses, MOOC, etc.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Regarding the adoption of Indian languages, the college offers various Indian languages like Marathi and Hindi subjects in its courses. Preservation and promoting of languages is one of the targets of the College in future. The different types of Linguistic competitions are organized through cultural committees. Cultural committee organizes an intercollegiate competition. College has a Department of Arts & Humanities with full time language teachers; 11 faculty are Ph.D. holders. The College Library has a collection of 25000+ books, magazines and journals of Indian languages. The college publishes it's magazine named "Tutari" in which literature based in Indian languages is published by the students.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The College makes an effort for students to comprehend that the pursuit of knowledge is a lifelong endeavor and to acquire a positive attitude and other qualities that will lead to a prosperous life. Students will be able to interpret, evaluate, and develop responsibility and effective citizenship as one of the program's outcomes. The institution adheres to the curriculum established by the Board of Studies for various subjects affiliated with KBCNMU, Jalgaon. There are Programme Outcomes, and Course Outcomes available in library and institutional website. Each course is assigned a credit value and the faculty carefully evaluates students using Continuous Evaluation, Online/Home Assignments, Oral Exams, and subjective evaluations. The college thus strives to impart outcome-based education.
6. Distance education/online education:	The College is also preparing itself to offer vocational courses for the convenience of the student in near future. We have used technological tools especially during the pandemic period that include Google Classroom, Zoom, MS-Teams, and videos as teaching and learning aids, The college has successfully implemented the e-content development facility for the students during the COVID 19 Pandemic situation during 2020-21 & 2021-22. The student can access anytime, anywhere the material stream wise, class wise, subject wise, syllabus, digital books, video lectures, MCQ sets, free online periodicals /magazine links, online courses links, etc. made available to students through whatsapp groups. We are also planning to start a digital studio in the future.

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The college adheres to the university's recommended curriculum and is affiliated with Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. The affiliating university prepares and updates the curriculum and syllabus. In the workshop that the university's Board of Studies has convened, the curriculum for various topics is discussed and developed. As a result, adherence to the established syllabi is followed by our college.

For effective implementation of the curriculum, the college prepares a roadmap every year.

1. Academic Calendar Preparation:

- Prior to the beginning of the academic year, departments of the college arrange their academic calendars in accordance with the university calendar.
- This provides an accurate depiction of the available dates for significant activities to ensure proper teaching-learning transactions and evaluations.
- The academic calendar is posted on the college's website and notice board for the convenience of all stakeholders. The academic calendar is followed for the admissions process, actual teaching days, holidays, university exams, and extracurricular programmes.

2. Preliminary work at departmental level:

- At the beginning of the academic year, there is discussion on the course outline and the distribution of tasks to individual teachers.
- Teachers create a monthly lesson plan based on the following considerations,
 - Dates and times available for the teaching-learning process.
 - Scope of the curriculum to be covered.
- The teaching plans are prepared and followed.

3. Process of effective implementation of curriculum

3.1 Follow up of lectures

• Every teacher records daily instruction and learning activities, for which they are provided with an academic diary. The department heads oversee daily classroom activities.

3.2 Use of Information and Communication Technology

• Frequent use of ICT-based teaching with PowerPoint presentations, animations, and video clips,

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etc., aids students' comprehension of the material.

• During the closure period of COVID-19, lectures were delivered via online platforms such as Zoom, Google Meet and YouTube. Through continuous monitoring, IQAC assured the effective delivery of the course curriculum.

4. Continuous Internal Assessment

- Based on the master schedule, departmental schedules are prepared and posted online. Syllabus completion, revision, and internal evaluation are on time per the academic calendar.
- Students are constantly assessed. Timed tests, assignments, presentations, and mock practical exams are given. Institutional websites list internal evaluation criteria. The college exam committee posts grades on the notice board promptly.
- During the COVID-19 period, internal examinations were administered online via Google Forms. The relevant subject instructor submits internal grades via the university's e-suvidha portal.

5. Periodical Meetings:

- Department heads hold regular meetings to guarantee smooth teaching-learning.
- For smooth curriculum implementation, vice principals and heads of each department meet with the principal periodically.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

- The vision and mission statement makes it abundantly clear that the entire college process is student-centric and centred on their overall development.
- Owing to the fact that the majority of our students come from villages, our teachers are aware of the aspirations of such students. In addition to the 'Chalk and Talk' and 'Lecture Delivery' methods, teachers emphasise the ICT Based Teaching of their subject matter.

- To educate students, the college makes use of a variety of different ICT-based instruments. Online learning platforms, educational software, LCD Projectors, and multimedia presentations are some examples of the technologies that fall under this category.
- They improve the efficiency of teaching while also making students' education more interesting and engaged in the process of learning.

1. Experiential Learning

- In addition to the field projects that are required for students in the Departments of Geography and Commerce, students and all of the other departments are strongly encouraged to obtain hands-on experience with the topics that they are studying in the classroom.
- History and Geography departments makes regular trips to the historical and geographically renowned sites located in the surrounding area.
- Departments belonging to science and commerce stream strategically organize field and industrial visits.
- Students have access to the necessary technological and infrastructure facilities, including LCD projectors and laptops for presentations.

2. Participative learning

- Students actively participate in their departmental seminar, group discussion, classroom projects, assignment problems, chart problems, which enhances their participative learning.
- The students of these departments visit nearby banks, industries, and villages in order to comprehend and gain practical experience with bank transactions, microfinance groups, and land measurement, etc.
- Students are encouraged to ask questions and share their ideas in class, and Peer Learning evaluates their participation.
- Collaborative learning is supported by allotting group project and minor-projects to a group of 3-4 students under the supervision of a faculty.

3. Problem-solving methodologies

- Students study through practical, fieldwork, and industry visits throughout curriculum implementation. Teachers emphasise problem-solving attitude among students.
- For instance, colleges host professional talks on various topics for this. Field trips, role-playing and other activities help learners improve their abilities.

ICT Based facilities for Learning

- The college has procured 03 LCD projectors. 01 Multipurpose hall, 01 classrooms and 01 departments is outfitted with LCD projector.
- The college provided some department with its own PC and printer.
- The College has installed a separate Wi-Fi system for students on campus.
- In addition, there is a computer lab with an internal LAN.
- The teachers use PowerPoint and multimedia to meaningfully simplify the course contents.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Due to the college's affiliated nature and its consequent adherence to the university-recommended evaluation system, there is little room for modification in exam system.

At present, semester system for all levels has been implemented by the university. Total weightage for external evaluation is 60% and for internal evaluation is 40%

Considering the importance of continuous formative assessment of students, the college implemented following measures:

- College has formed examination committee to ensure all activities related to internal and external examinations.
- Decentralised Internal Examination system is adopted to ensure efficiency and openness.
- Throughout the academic year, term-by-term Formative and Summative Assessments are administered as part of the evaluation procedure.
- Through Formative Assessments, the intellectual and skill-based development of the student is evaluated and monitored continuously. At the conclusion of each term, Summative Assessment is conducted via term-end examinations.

Internal Examination and Assessment:

- For the continuous and consistent internal evaluation process to be transparent and effective, the college examination committee is responsible for monitoring the mechanism throughout the year.
- The University has established guidelines for the internal evaluation of students; consequently, the college administers the internal evaluation.
- Following consultation with IQAC, the college examination committee has implemented the following reforms.

- The evaluation procedure is transparent and accountable because the answer sheets are shown to the students following scoring.
- Their performance is discussed with the students after the evaluation.
- This modification has been approved based on experimental evidence in order to obtain the best results.
- The answer sheets are preserved and recorded for future clarification and application.
- If a student is unable to attend the scheduled internal exam due to unavoidable circumstances or reasons, the student is given an additional opportunity.
- Students who complete two years of NSS with camp, excellent cultural activities, and university physical examination receive ten extra marks to encourage co-curricular activities.

External examination and evaluation:

- The examination committee monitors the process of internal examinations in the college.
- Practical examinations are assessed by the external examiners appointed by the University.
- The Examination Section is equipped with internet,

Equipment and staff.

- Nearly all the operations of examinations are computerized.
- The examination activities such as filling up examination forms, submission of internal and practical marks, list of the students, issue of hall-tickets, examination circulars etc. are processed online with the aid of University online portal.
- The question papers are downloaded and supplied to candidates during examinations.

Exam related grievances:

- All exam-related complaints are directed to the committee chaired by the Principal.
- Upon receiving any exam-related grievance from the student, at the primary level, the committee discusses the issue with the concerned instructor and finds a solution.
- The results of the student's internal examinations are posted on the notice board, and their questions are answered to their satisfaction.

Attainment of CO and PO:

- The Sanstha always emphasize on the output of student. It regularly directs to the IQAC to execute it properly
- Each IQAC meeting includes in-depth discussion, which is then repeated to teachers and students at the departmental level. It is also taken into account whether achieving these results might be simple or difficult.
- To effectively communicate the learning objectives and anticipated outcomes, the college hosts lectures on career counselling and programmes for skill development.

Students' level of course outcome (CO) attainment is evaluated through,

- The course outcomes (COs) are evaluated via discussion, unbiased observation, evaluation of tutorials, home assignments, and class tests, among other methods.
- The subject teachers continuously assess students' progress through practical lessons as well, which can be used to determine their level of CO attainment.
- The subject teachers evaluate the students' subject knowledge through seminars and group discussions, which helps to determine the level of COs attainment.
- Students are given project assignments that are supervised by the relevant guide.
- The students' growth in analytical and application skills is monitored throughout the supervision process.
- COs are measured using the observations made during such supervision.
- The mentor-teacher keeps track of the students' academic progress. Determining CO attainment level is aided by the mentoring.

- The college uses cloud-based Mastersoft software for its admissions, payroll, and account management. The cloud-based salary sleep app of Mastersoft Cloud is provided to faculty and non-teaching staff.

- This application is cross-platform, multilingual, and client-server based. Additionally, the library has an OPAC facility for searching for books.
- The library has created a website for the convenience of all stakeholders. In addition, barcode facility is available for library users.

Medical claim:

Medical claim is facilitated through Joint Director of Higher Education of the Government of Maharashtra.

Financial support for conferences:

The college provides funding in the form of re-imbursement of registration fees and TA and/or DA to teaching staff for attending conferences, workshops, etc of considerable importance.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

- The College is entirely funded by the Government of Maharashtra and included in section 2(f) section 12B of the 1956 UGC Act.
- The college also receives funding from tuition fees, library fees, gymkhana fees, donations from stakeholders, government and non-government funds, and grants for conducting seminars, workshops, and conferences from the KBC NMU and the Maharashtra government, among others.
- The college has in the past received infrastructure funding from the UGC, New Delhi, which utilized according to regulations and for intended use.
- The institution has an effective mechanism for fund mobilization. Management consistently allocates a significant portion of their budget to infrastructure development and maintenance.
- The IQAC and UGC committees are constantly on the lookout for new sources of funding and have

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developed a systematic method for maximizing their utilization.

- The college designed its policies for efficient implementation and optimal resource utilization. Few contractual support personnel are hired through the appropriate channels.
- The collected and utilized funds are collected via Cheque, RTGS, or NEFT. According to the CDC's priorities and recommendations, the funds are used for infrastructure development and beautification, ICT device and upgrade, student development, and skill-based course equipment. The received fund is spent through the appropriate channels.
- All the financial transactions are subject to internal check and control. Every voucher is passed through Accountant, and Principal.

Financial audits:

The institution has both an internal and external audit system.

Internal Audit:

• An internal audit is conducted regularly which checks the financial accounts, and suggests corrections, if required, which are carried out by accounts department. The auditor notifies the principal of any remaining questions.

Statutory Audit:

- An account clerk performs the internal audit, while a chartered accountant **Mr.Sujay Jogalekar** is appointed by the institution for each fiscal year to conduct the external audit.
- The external auditor's audited report is presented to the management in the meeting for review and correction, if necessary. The auditor comments on errors for which corrective action is required to prevent their repetition in the future.

Inspection by Joint Director:

- In the second phase, a representative of the joint director of higher education for the Jalgaon region examines the legality of receipts and expenditures by carefully reviewing the audited financial statements.
- The Joint Director of Higher Education, the Senior Auditor, and the Auditor General of the State conduct periodic audits of the government assessment.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

- As per the guidelines set by NAAC, the IQAC of the college was established in 2005. The institute's initiatives have been propelled by the college's IQAC. The quality measures have evolved into an ongoing process that is reflected in the systems and procedures adopted for service delivery to stakeholders.
- The IQAC cell is led by the principal and coordinated by the team experienced faculty members and other members as suggested by the NAAC.

Title of the Practice 2

Sports for better health and career building

Goals:

- To inculcate the sports culture among students
- To motivate the students for awareness for physical and mental health and fitness
- To make available career opportunities for the students through imparting extra-curricular activities in desirable professions, such as the Indian Army, Navy, Maharashtra Police, SRPF, CRPF, and RPF, among others. To allow student athletes to join the aforementioned forces. If student athletes adhere to the protocol, their selection and placement are conceivable.
- Physical education cultivates a sense of patriotism, responsibility, and accountability as a citizen.

Context:

- Due to the indiscriminate use of automobiles, people's physical mobility has become severely constrained in the current era, resulting in India's population becoming the epicenter of diabetes. This also has a social and economic impact. Consequently, the significance of physical education plays a crucial function.
- Majority of students come from rural and backward areas; therefore, they do not have access to sports facilities. However, our college is working to increase their participation and instill health awareness as well as career-based opportunities.
- The chances of sportsman to be placed for job positions after the completion of his/her graduation.
- Because the students who were accepted into the institution do not come from a sporting background, the department of physical education is responsible for advising them.

The practice:

- Sessions aimed at inspiring and energizing the students are held regularly. Students that express interest in participating in the designated sports are put through regular selection and practice processes. Sports department daily take sports activities and sports sessions.
- In addition to giving instruction, we also organize a variety of other programs. Since past two years, the Department of Physical Education has offered a Certificate Course in Yoga and Pranayam.
- The groups of current players are formed each player is allotted to each alumni. The players are allotted as mentees to the senior alumni player as a mentor. Mentor mentee scheme proves helpful for the students' players as they seek help during their placement camps in the metro cities like Nashik, Pune, and Mumbai etc. Mentor helps mentee socially and economically also other than helping in developing sports skills. We are running this scheme as "Vichardhan Yojana".
- Students are encouraged to compete at the state level, as well as at the intercollegiate, intergroup, and interuniversity levels. 'Kridashilp', 'Pranayam Udayan', and 'Sport Selfie Point' are special attractions for participants on campus.
- During the yearly awards event, the winners receive a lot of acclaim from the audience. The winners get a variety of prizes, including trophies, keepsakes, kits, and other items.

Evidence of success:

- A significant proportion of students who came from underprivileged homes displayed their abilities throughout this physical screening exam, which increased their chances of placement.
- The college is ranking among top 10 colleges at university level in it's sports activities.
- 14 students took part in a state and all India inter University sport tournaments in the past 5 years. Many of which were encouraged to go on to compete at the professional and open championship at higher levels.
- This practice helped 15 students to be placed in various government jobs through sports reservation quota along with the help of their curricular skills.

Problems encountered and resources required:

- Majority of students admitted to college did not participate in sports during their school years; therefore, attracting them to physical education is a difficult undertaking. However, we continue to encourage them, despite the lack of resources, sports equipment, etc. These sporting products are either prohibitively expensive or unaffordable.
- Economically poor students are not able to find ample time for practice as they are engaged somewhere in the daily wages. Thus, the performance may affect.
